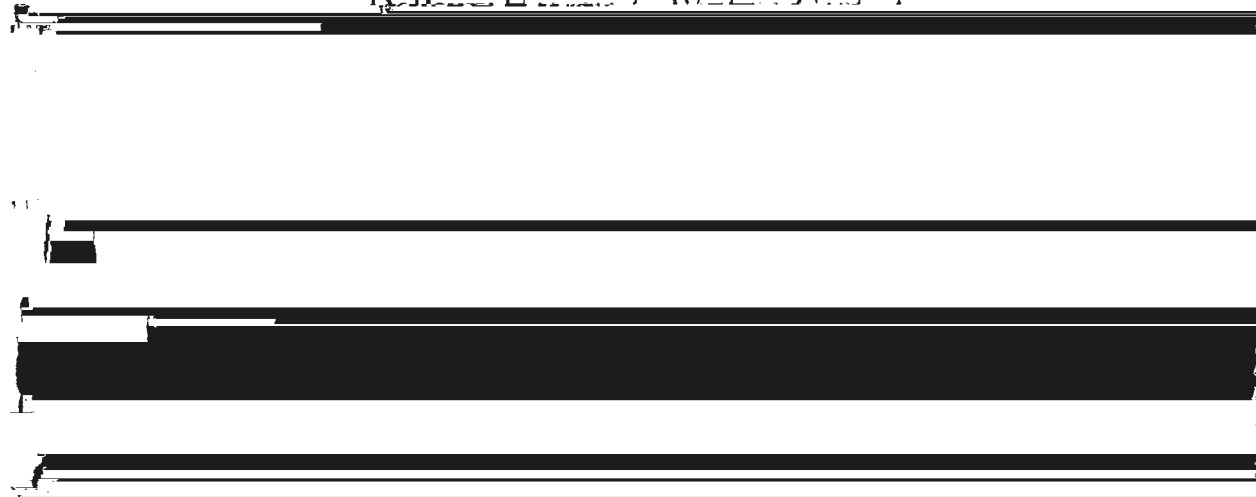


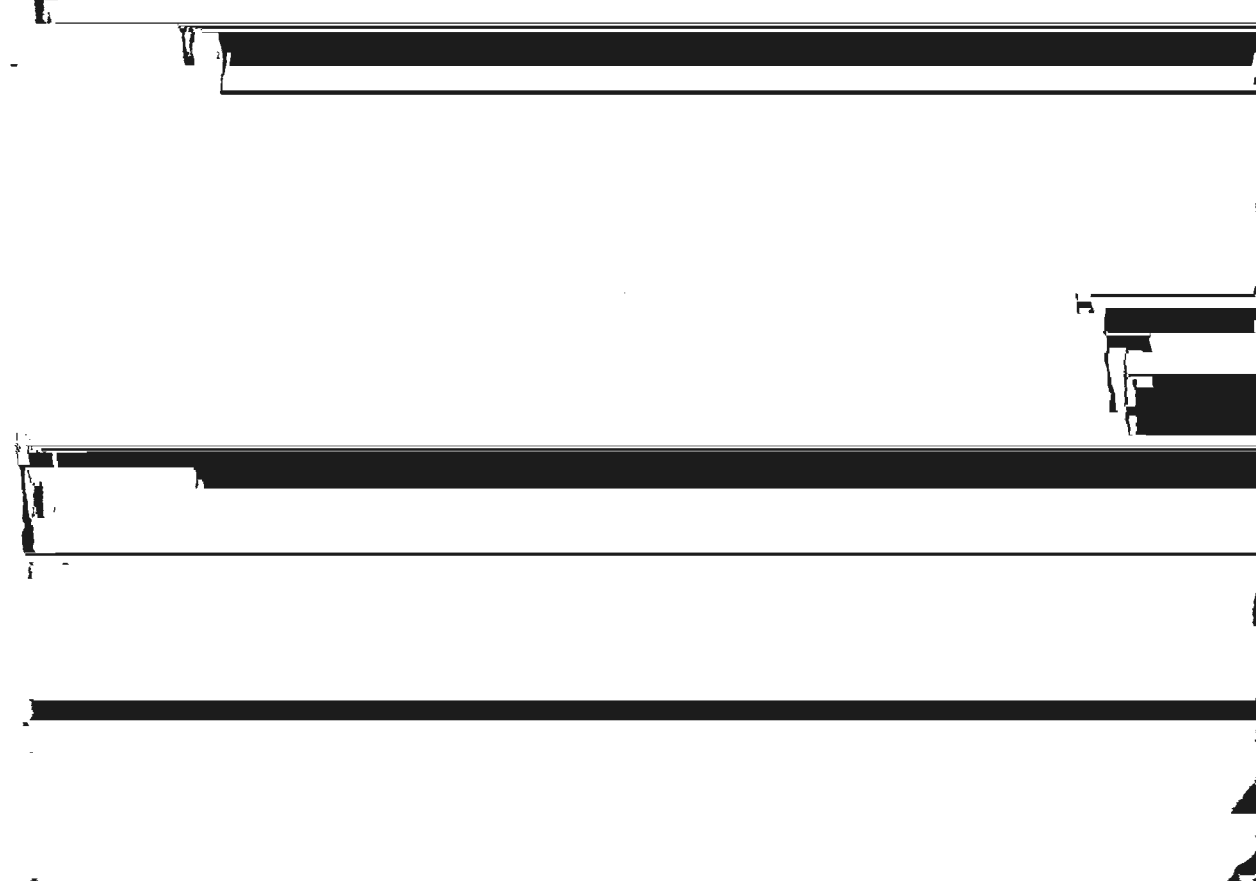
The Writing Process
